


2977 Kingston Road, October 2, 1972 – March 1, 2008








Cliffcrest Branch's new location in the Cliffcrest Plaza opened on April 3, 2008. McKinnon Design planned the new space, a 75 percent increase over the old location, expanding from 2,800 to 4,900 square feet. The budget for the branch relocation and expansion was \$585,500.







Cliffcrest became Toronto Public Library's first "browsing branch" in April 2008, with open-facing shelving (similar to retail stores) to display popular books, magazines, and audio-visual materials. Reading lounges were provided for

Cliffcrest Branch opened to the public on October 2, 1972 in a storefront leased at 2977 Kingston Road in Cliffcrest Plaza. It was the tenth branch operated by the Scarborough Public Library Board, and replaced a bookmobile stop at the plaza.

> Consideration for a branch library to serve Scarborough's "thickly populated section of Cliffside in the south" started back in 1956. The same year, bookmobiles began to make regular stops in the local area.

Over the next 15 years, community

residents were increasingly vocal about their desire for a library, until on February 19, 1970, the Scarborough Public Library Board approved "in principle the establishment of a branch library in the Cliffcrest Plaza dependent on the availability of funds."

In 1971, the library board budgeted \$180,000 to open the new neighbourhood library. The following year, it invited the community to form an advisory group to help plan the new branch.

Cliffcrest Branch became part of the

Toronto Public Library in 1998, with municipal amalgamation. Refurbished in 1985 and 2001, the branch was closed temporarily on March 1, 2008 to relocate to a different unit in Cliffcrest Plaza (at 3017 Kingston Road), which reopened on April 3, 2008.
